
One reason this has been such a fun job is because it is new every day. There is always something different to

TOURS



This has been a great year for tours! We conducted private tours from May to October. There were several Grayling school tours. Head Start and Mary Nama's 7th grade class visited the museum in May. In September, we had 45 1st and 2nd graders; October brought us high school students from the community service class. Also, the whole 3rd grade class (135 students) took a tour. They enjoyed the museum so

much and realized its importance that they raised \$200.00. What a glowing example they are for the community! Our hats are off to them.

In June, the Michelson's Men's Club (60 men) took an evening tour of the museum.

In July, the Elderberries, a group of 14, had a very pleasant lunch in the courtyard and afterward, toured the museum.

In August, a group of 30 re-

tired military veterans who traveled to Grayling in their RVs and stayed at Camp Grayling, visited the museum.

The Red Hat Ladies were also here in August. They enjoyed their ice cream social, then took a walk to tour the museum.

And last but not least, the Home Extenders, a women's club from Roscommon, took a tour one October evening.

TRAINS

The big event of the year for the Historical Society took place October 7th and 8th. Big Bertha rolled in to the Michigan Central Railroad depot pulling its vintage cars filled with happy riders, waving as they arrived at their destination. Bluewater Excursions conducted the trip which began in Kawkawlin and ended in Grayling. One of our local

artists, Elaine Lucksted, created a wonderful painting of the Santa Fe, a 1928 vintage businessman's car which was to be part of the train this year. Prints are available from the Museum.

The Grayling Color Tour was also a big hit as people got on board for a round trip from

Grayling to Waters and enjoyed the autumn colors.

Later in October, the Algonquin Park, a restored 1954 private luxury railcar, made two trips from West Branch to Grayling.

These events were so much fun and were a remembrance of days gone by.

MILITARY DISPLAY



When you're in the area, please stop by the Northland Area Federal Credit Union on the I-75 Business Loop in Grayling. On loan from the museum is part of our military display. It will be at the credit union through the Christmas season.

Included in the display are mannequins dressed in uniform, helmets and hats depicting the various services, large photos of the military at Camp Grayling, and a table filled with war memorabilia dating back to the Civil War.

All the branches of the credit

union are participating in a Christmas display contest.. The Grayling branch decided that they wanted to have a military theme to their display. The feedback from customers is great. The display is being met with rave reviews!

RIVER DISPLAY

This summer, the Board voted to go ahead with the creation of a display of the Au Sable River since it is such an integral part of the area.

There are four display cases in the lobby which are lined with blue satin material to give the appearance of the river. The cases contain artifacts depicting life on the river beginning with the Native Americans, then the Europeans and trappers, followed by the lumber industry

and ending with the present use of the river including fishing and canoeing.

As work progressed on the display, we held a contest for a mural-type picture of the River to hang on the wall above one of the display cases. Three judges chose an eye-catching photograph.

In one corner on the wall hang photographs of men who built riverboats or were guides.

The Canoe Marathon Race section is in the hallway, complete with photos and information about all racers since its inception in 1947. A bookcase holds race memorabilia including a wooden paddle Ted Engle used in 1948 and a commemorative coin set in a miniature paddle.

The display is complete with the riverboat that Arthur E. Wakeley made in 1918 which is suspended from the ceiling in the lobby.



CREW ROOM

One of the rooms upstairs has been transformed into what it originally was—sleeping quarters for the railroad crew. Panelling was torn down, carpet pulled up, and the room painted from top to bottom in its original green color. By the way, every depot in the state was painted the same green

color from top to bottom. Even the outside of the buildings were painted in the same color!

The room is sparsely furnished as it was so long ago. There are two metal beds with bedding, a wooden table between them, an oil lamp on the table, a wooden chair in the corner

and a throw rug on the floor. There are also old-fashioned hooks along one wall where the crew would have hung their clothes.

Nostalgia now sleeps in the room.
